HAPPY WANDERERS' HIKING GROUP

The hiking group had a lovely outing on May 11. Our long awaited visit to the Old Ford Ranch (privately owned) in rural Penn Valley aligned perfectly with the weather, a balmy 70 degrees. The land is rolling hills, meadows and forests, with Lake Englebright at its northern edge. This

is not far from Bridgeport. Horse back riding and walking has been allowed with the owner's permission for 40 years. Eleven of us set off in high spirits, we hiked up a gentle ridge to the boundary of the property, then headed down to a huge meadow. Unfortunately we were not able to approach the Indian grinding rock area as the caretaker had his goats grazing on them, maybe next year. We skirted around a large meadow, through some woods and right through a smaller meadow filled with poppies and other wildflowers. Everyone was intrigued with the Pit of Doom, a repository for no longer living farm animals.

We saw a largish patch of Chinese Houses, they look like little pagodas. We saw many thousands of globe lilies, also known as fairy lanterns. A few of us plan to go back one night to see them all lit up! There were also the green parts of Tiger Lilies, not blooming yet.

Down, down to the lake to a wonderful picnic area, this is a boat-in campground with lots of tables and an outhouse. Then up, up the hill, past some bee hives (the honey is available at Briar Patch), past another meadow with the tiniest ever frogs hopping around the streamlets.

We hiked around seven miles. There is a slightly longer version that includes a sidetrip to a waterfall that we may be able to go to next year. A good time was had by all. The meadow at the end of the hike is so large and lovely that if a person didn't want to hike at all, perhaps just wanted to look around or bring a chair and read, they would not be bored or disappointed. The main concerns are ticks and poison oak. I brought home a tick.

German-American Car Makers: Fred and "Augie" Duesenberg

Friedrich and August Düsenberg were born in Kirchheide, Lippe-Detmold, Germany in the late 1870's and immigrated with their family who settled in Rockford, Iowa in 1885. The boys attended public school but had no training in mechanical design other than self-taught and what was gleaned through work experience. Nonetheless, they produced iconic luxury passenger cars in the late 1920's and into the Great Depression years of the 1930's. The

Duesenberg supercharged straight-eight single overhead cam engine produced more horsepower (265) than any other motor of its day, and the car was capable of speeds of 130 miles per hour. The Duesenberg car was sold as a chassis, to be bodied by other companies, such as Bowman and Schwartz or Murphy Coachbuilders. The chassis weighed about two tons; the bodies typically weighed about 2,500 pounds, so the cars were quite heavy. They were also expensive, costing more than ten times the annual earnings of an average working man during the Depression. From lack of sales, the Duesenberg automobile company went bankrupt in 1937.

Added note: The 1935 Duesenberg model SSJ (roadster version of what is shown above) once owned by film actor Gary Cooper sold at the Pebble Beach auction in 2018 for a record-breaking \$22 million.

Teutonic Technology: Hydrogen-Powered Aircraft



We're spoiled. We have grown accustomed to traveling at 450 miles per hour in a sleek airplane powered by highly-refined kerosene (which is what jet fuel is, actually). But, that kerosene is a fossil fuel, derived from petroleum, and it produces carbon dioxide when it burns, which is neither environmentally friendly nor sustainable. Researchers in Germany are doing groundbreaking work using hydrogen as an alternative to kerosene as airplane fuel. Hydrogen can be derived using renewable resources. When burned, it produces no CO2. It could be burned directly in a jet engine, or it could be converted to electricity to power a propellor-driven plane, such as the concept model above. The technical hurdle is that both approaches require enormous quantities of liquified hydrogen to be carried on board the aircraft in heavy fuel tanks. The German Aerospace Center (DLR) is working on the problem. In 2022, H2Fly, a spinoff of DLR, built a hydrogen-powered test plane that reached an altitude of 7,200 feet (a world record for hydrogen-powered aircraft). Maybe they're on to something. Then again, maybe we should get used to the idea of train travel in the future.
