German-American in History

Joseph Werner was a German-American automotive engineer who worked for the Ford Company in Dearborn, Michigan, in the late 1920's and early '30's during the era of the Ford Model T. Werner knew about Ford's mass-production techniques, especially the art and science in building engines in volume. In Germany in the mid-1930's, Ferdinand Porsche, inventor of the Volkswagen, recruited (some might say, "poached" or "inveigled") a handful of German-American engineers away from Ford to relocate to Wolfsburg, Germany to help mass-produce the VW equivalent of the US Army Jeep, the Kübelsitzwagen (bucket seat car). The Kübelsitzwagen became known as the Kübelwagen or simply the Kübel and became a favorite light vehicle of the German Wehrmacht. Apparently, Werner's loyalty was to automotive engineering rather than to the Nazi regime. Joseph Werner's team occupied a small portion of the huge Wolfsburg factory. His shop produced the essential engine-transmission assembly. The rest of the factory assembled pieces of the vehicle shipped in from other suppliers. The Porsche factory today operates similarly.



Above is a photo of a Type 82 Kübelwagen from 1939. In 1968, VW introduced Type 181, known in the USA as the "VW Thing," shown at right, which bears a striking resemblance to the old Kübelwagen. Could this be Joseph Werner's lasting legacy?



Of Interest to Happy Wanderers: Mückenschutz!




Have you noticed that the mosquitos are particularly abundant this spring? Whether you're hiking with the Happy Wanderers or working outside in your garden, it's important to protect yourself from mosquitos ("Mückenschutz" is German for



"Mosquito protection"!). Most of us already know what to do: Protect your skin with long sleeves and long pants, wear mosquito repellant, gloves, and a head net as shown on the left. There's an excellent article on the web describing this in greater detail: https://alexysabroad.com/repel-mosquitoes-while-hiking/ If your efforts at protection are unsuccessful and you get

bitten anyway, i.e., you have moved from prevention into "damage control," the article describes a nifty device for literally sucking the mosquito toxin out of your skin and stopping the itch. It's trade-named the "Bug Bite Thing." It is a small hand- operated suction pump that you place on the site of the insect bite, apply suction by operating the

handles, and then leave in place for 20 seconds. Testimonials say this potential hickey-maker actually works. It seems that for best results it be deployed as soon as possible after the mosquito has bitten you. If you're interested in making a head net as shown above, the mosquito netting is available locally at Big 5 Sporting Goods for about \$7. You need to supply your own wide-brimmed hat. Mosquitos are attracted to chemicals on your skin and can thereby find you in the dark. It turns out that they are also attracted to the odor of Limburger cheese.
