<u>Teutonic Technology -- Fruehauf Trailers</u>



Does this logo look familiar? Maybe you noticed it when you overtook a semi-tractor-trailer rig on the

highway. Years ago, it seemed that almost every large trailer had a Fruehauf logo on the left rear where passing motorists would see it. The Fruehauf trailer company was founded by August Fruehauf, a second-generation German-American, in 1918. Fruehauf is



credited with the invention of the "semi" trailer, one that has a set of rear wheels, but no front wheels. Instead, the weight of the front end of the trailer is born by the towing vehicle ("tractor"), such as in the photo at left of a 1914 early version of Fruehauf's semi-trailer being towed by a

Model T Ford. Fruehauf is also credited with the "fifth wheel" trailer hitch, hydraulic lift gates to aid in loading and unloading, dual wheels to distribute load and prevent roadway damage, the refrigerated semi trailer, electrically-operated trailer brakes, cargo

shipping containers, and several incremental improvements on the hitch and trailer suspension.

August ("Gus") Fruehauf was the son of German immigrants Charles and Sophia Fruefauf, who immigrated to the Detroit area in the mid-19th century. Gus inherited old world metal smithing skills and a strong German work ethic from his father.
